ST. MARY'S SR., ATTACK

The Towson recruit collected 38 goals and 41 assists. He scored a hat trick, including the game-winner in overtime, to lead St. Mary's to an 11-10 victory over

Severn. "Matt was a great leader for us," Saints coach Matt Hogan said. "He directed our offense and led by example. He was very, very consistent for us. His play in the Severn game is probably one he'll remember for a very long time."

The leading scorer for the Falcons, Jones totaled 67 points on the year with 36 goals and 31 assists. He recorded five goals and four assists

in a game against Chesapeake and has verbally committed to play at Army. "He was pretty consistent all year," Severna Park coach Larry Kramer said. "When we needed a big assist he got it, when we needed a big goal, he got it."

DONOVAN LANGE



NORTHEAST JR., ATTACK

Crafty attackman was a balanced scorer for the Eagles, totaling 41 goals and 41 assists to lead public school scorers with 82 points. Named

one of two high school All-Americans for the County League. "Donovan is a complete attackman. He's a playmaker, a finisher and a very strong rider. He's also very good on ground balls," Northeast head coach Walt Blahut said. Lange is already receiving interest from several Division I schools.

MATT GREGOIRE



SOUTH RIVER SR., ATTACK

The Seahawks' leading scorer, Gregoire scored 47 goals and assisted on five more. The junior was a strong inside player and showed a great ability to

back down defenders around the cage. "He's a very coachable kid and a smart kid," South River coach Paul Noone said. "He's willing to learn at any time. Any time we got to the point where we needed a goal, Matt was our go-to-guy."

JIMMY GIBBONS



SOUTHERN JR., ATTACK
