The Cavaliers' captain and leading scorer, Page finished the season with team highs of 16 goals and 17 assists. She is Spalding's second all-time

leading goal scorer (56), and first in career assists (42). She will be playing defense next year at the University of Maryland.

"Erica had a terrific season for us," Spalding coach Bob Dieterle said. "She was a great leader on and off the field and was everything you could ask for in a captain."

MAGGIE MORRISON

Morrison helped spearhead Archbishop Spalding's offensive attack, totaling 14 goals off the bench. She excelled in key matchups, scoring

big goals against John Carroll and South River, and she scored in the 77th minute of the IAAM A Conference title game.

"Maggie really attacks the goal and uses her speed," Spalding coach Bob Dieterle said. "She always played her best in really big games."

Brummitt was the focal point of the Panthers' offense, finishing with 11 goals and six assists. She led Annapolis (8-6) to its first winning season in 15 years.

CHRISTINE FLANAGAN

The points leader among county public schools (14 goals, nine assists) and two-time offensive team MVP, Flanagan was the offensive force who

propelled the Seahawks to a county title.

"Christine is a very creative, receptive player," South River coach John Sis said. "She's been huge in our program's improvement, helping us to be more competitive. She was invaluable this season."

Speedy junior split time at forward and center midfield, scoring a team-high 14 goals on the season, including game-winners against rivals Severna Park

and South River.

Her overtime strike against the Seahawks lifted to Wildcats to the Class 4A East Region championship game.

"Cisca is extremely explosive and came through when the team needed her," Arundel coach Laura Coe said.

LINDSAY SAUNDERS



NORTHEAST SR., MF

The Eagles' leading scorer and primary offensive weapon, Saunders scored 11 goals, including a hat trick against Glen Burnie in the second game of

the season. She helped lead Northeast to a 6-6-2 mark, a year after finishing 4-13-1. Saunders is the first person to lead the Eagles in scoring all four years.

"If it wasn't for Lindsay playing up top, I'm not sure that we would have scored," Eagles coach Charlie Parks said.

Keer was both an offensive catalyst for the Wildcats, with 10 assists, and a defensive presence at center midfield. Keer played dominant

in the middle to help her team control possessions and also scored three goals.

"Sydney was one of the hardest working players I've had the pleasure of coaching," Arundel coach Laura Coe said. "She was a huge playmaker for us offensively and made plays on defense when we needed her."

The leader of the rebuilding Cougars, Lupinek switched from attack to midfield to help the team control the middle of the field.

Towson-bound and a speedy player with natural talent, she helped initiate the Cougars' offensive attacks.

coming up with saves on an empty net, as well as an offensive playmaker and leader for the Wildcats.

A dominant defender and anchor of the Cavaliers' back line, Frank led a stingy defense that had nine consecutive shutouts to finish

the year and 14 overall. An All-IAAM A Conference selection, Frank helped secure her team's IAAM A Conference championship with a 2-0 shutout of McDonogh.

"Kirsten plays hard every game," Cavaliers coach Bob Dieterle said. "She's very consistent, and she runs the defense."

The Capital-Gazette Coach of the Year for the second consecutive season, led the Cavaliers to their second IAAM A Conference title in

three seasons. The Cavaliers posted a 19-0-1 mark in winning the title in 2006, and they went 19-1-3 this season. Spalding bested McDonogh, the No. 2 team in the country according to the NSCAA/adidas poll, 2-0, in the finals to claim the crown.
