

ADAM MACBRIDE



SEVERNA PARK SR., A

The Providence-bound attacker scored a game-winner in the District V final and led the Falcons with 40 goals and 41 assists en route to their fifth state title. He scored twice and had four assists in the state final.

"He had an outstanding year leading the offense," Severna Park coach Larry Kramer said. "He really stepped up for us in big games."

JUSTIN WARD



OLD MILL SR., A

A Loyola-bound attackman and one of the best players to come out of Old Mill, Ward finished his senior season with 64 points, including 30 goals. Ward is a well-

balanced attacker with good field vision. He was selected as an All-American by the public school coaches.

Old Mill coach Steve Spence had high praise, calling Ward "one of the smartest players I've coached in 12 years."

WADE KORVIN



SPALDING JR., A

Korvin took his game to another level and ranked among leading scorers in the MIAA A Conference with 31 goals and 19 assists. He scored a career-high five

goals against Gilman, and he's attracted the interest of numerous Division I programs.

"Wade has great lacrosse skills and terrific athletic ability," Cavaliers coach Zack Burke said.

GREG KORVIN



ARUNDEL SR., A

A three-year starter and UMBC-bound attackman, Korvin led the Wildcats offensively with 35 goals and 36 assists to move into seventh in all-time career points

(165) in program history.

"He was a leader by example," Arundel coach Kevin Necessary said. "We were a young team, and Greg took the leadership role very well this year."

RYLAND DE POL



ST. MARY'S SR., A

The sharp-shooting left-hander had posted 55 goals and 17 assists. De Pol, an Air Force recruit, was almost automatic with time and space.

"Ryland has a heck of a crank shot and scored in just about every way imaginable," St. Mary's coach Matt Hogan said. "His enthusiasm for lacrosse was contagious."

BRIAN COOPER



SPALDING SR., M

The do-it-all middle was a force in all aspects of the game, gobbling up ground balls, playing sound defense and scoring 43 points, including 29 goals.

The All-MIAA and All-American selection will join his older brother at Maryland.

"Brian is an old school type of player, a tenacious, tough middle, who is hard-working and willing to do whatever is asked," Cavaliers coach Zack Burke.

KYLE ZORN



SEVERNA PARK SR., M

A three-year starter, Zorn stepped up this season to provide a consistent scoring threat from midfield. The senior, who will attend Stony Brook

next year, had 38 goals and 10 assists for the state champions.

"For a middle to have that many goals and that many points," Falcons coach Larry Kramer said, "it's impressive."

JOHN HOGAN



ST. MARY'S SR., M

An All-MIAA selection and a Cornell recruit, Hogan epitomized offensive balance with 27 goals and 25 assists. He'll spend a prep year at Deerfield Academy.

"John is a very cerebral player who understands the game and is a good decision-maker," St. Mary's coach Matt Hogan said. "He is a very competitive kid, who is willing to do whatever the team needs."

MARK MCNEILL



ST. MARY'S SR., M

An imposing presence at 6-foot-4 and 220 pounds, McNeill ranked second on the team with 30 goals, despite always drawing the long pole. The Under

Armour All-American will play football and lacrosse at North Carolina.

"Mark is just an unbelievable athlete, one of the best in St. Mary's history," coach Matt Hogan said. "Opponents focused their defense on stopping him."

JOJO COOPER



SOUTH RIVER SR., M

Cooper took the faceoffs and rarely left the field, playing extra-man offense and man-down defense. He totaled nine goals and 10 assists, but the intangibles were

the hallmark of his game.

"If we needed something, we told JoJo this is what we've got to do," Seahawks coach Paul Noone said. "He hustled to the end and always wanted to stay on the field. He's a true competitor."

CONNOR HUNT



SEVERNA PARK SR., D

The 6-foot-3, 215-pound defender will join his older brother, Chris, at UNC. An All-American long pole, Hunt was a three-year standout

for the state champion Falcons and scored six goals this season — one in the final.

"He's been one of the best players on our team for the past three seasons," Falcons coach Larry Kramer said.

KEVIN COSTA



ARUNDEL SR., D

A three-year starter who will play at Belmont Abbey next year, Costa held every player he covered to two points or less and also scooped 59 ground balls.

"Kevin became one of the best man-on-man defenders in the area," Arundel coach Kevin Necessary said. "He is a tough, physical kid who made a tremendous progression throughout his career and will do very well in college."

CHRIS PICCIRILLI



SPALDING SR., D

The Villanova-bound close defender overwhelmed opposing attackmen with his combination of size (6-foot-5, 220 pounds) and strength. Piccirilli,

a linebacker, was an intimidating figure who went after ball-carriers aggressively and routinely took the ball away.

"Picc is a big, strong guy with great takeaway ability and solid stick-handling," Cavaliers coach Zack Burke said.

SAM CUNARD



SOUTH RIVER SR., D

A Lehigh recruit, Cunard was the shut-down defender, who led South River to a 14-3 record. Behind Cunard, the Seahawks held all but two teams

— Hereford and Severna Park, both state champions — below eight goals.

"He picks up every ground ball that comes to him," South River coach Paul Noone said. "Whatever they've got, we're putting Sam on him."

CAMERON ROWE



BROADNECK JR., D

A versatile defender and a captain on the soccer team, Rowe was a leader by example. His versatility working with or without the long pole gave the

Bruins flexibility on the field.

"He's effective as a long pole or a close defenseman," Broadneck coach Clay White said. "He can mark both the best middy or the best attackman."

DOM LAMOLINARA



ST. MARY'S SR., GK

The Maryland recruit posted 253 saves and a 6.5 goals-against average to earn an All-MIAA selection.

"Dom had a phenomenal season and was a huge part of our success," Saints coach Matt Hogan said. "I don't remember him giving up many soft goals, and he definitely took away a bunch of sure goals."

COACH OF THE YEAR: LARRY KRAMER, SEVERNA PARK



Blessed with playmakers on both sides of the field and a sturdy goalkeeper, Steven Lusby, Kramer guided the Falcons to their first undefeated season in program history — topping the 20-0 year with a 13-7 victory over Thomas S. Wootton in the Class 4A/3A state final.

Kramer's second title in four seasons with Severna Park, he and his coaching staff helped the players create matchup problems with whomever they faced. The Falcons knocked off Arundel on a last-season goal, handed Class 2A/1A state runner-up, Glenelg, a double-overtime loss to win the District V title and beat defending champion South River twice.

"I've never been on a perfect team," Kramer said. "It's really a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity."
